FROM GRASS ROOTS TO REGISTERED CHARITY

The Ryan Neuro Therapy Centre has a proud history rooted in community and care.

It began in the mid-1980s, when Monica Ryan and a group of people living with Multiple Sclerosis came together to form a support network. Meeting in a local church hall, they offered physiotherapist-led exercise sessions for those managing MS.

As demand grew, the group found premises at Queen Mary's Hospital in Carshalton and formally established a member organisation of around 100 people.

- 1994 Sutton & Croydon MS Therapy Centre was incorporated as a Company Limited by Guarantee
- 1995 Registered as a charity
- 1997 Purchased our permanent home on Lloyd Avenue, Coulsdon
- 2003 Extended our facilities to meet growing demand
- 2018 Renamed The Ryan MS
 Therapy Centre to reflect our wider geographical reach



• **2023** – Became *The Ryan Neuro Therapy Centre* to recognise our broader therapy offer for a range of neurological conditions

From a small local group to a trusted specialist Centre, we have grown while staying true to our founding purpose: to provide supportive, high-quality therapy for people living with neurological conditions.

Since the COVID pandemic, the Charity has adapted and developed its services to provide much more support to its members and their carers.

GOVERNANCE AT A GLANCE

How we are run & who is involved

The Ryan Neuro Therapy Centre is a registered charity and company limited by guarantee. Each member is a part-owner of the Centre and agrees to pay just £1 if the Centre ever needed to close and settle its debts.

We are legally able to fundraise and receive donations to support our work.

The Centre is overseen by a **Board of Trustees**, who are also the legal directors of the Company. All Trustees are **volunteers**, elected by and accountable to our members. They receive **no payment** for their service.

Trustee Responsibilities

Our Trustees are responsible for ensuring the Centre:

- Delivers on its charitable purpose
- Operates within charity law
- Manages resources responsibly
- Acts in the best interests of our members
- Upholds high standards and transparency



Governance in Practice

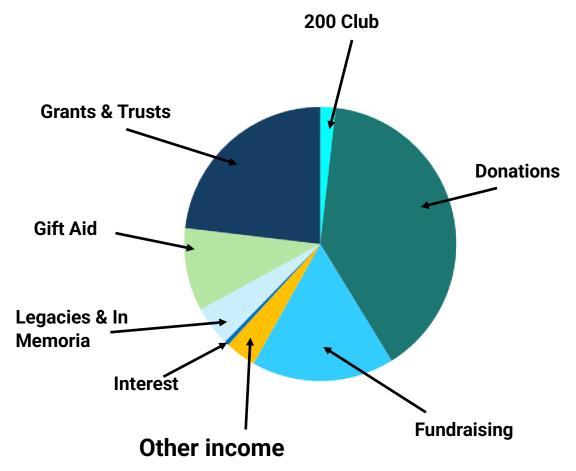
- All Trustees must be members of the Charity
- We maintain a minimum of three Trustees at all times
- One-third of Trustees retire each year (but can stand again)
- New Trustees are appointed by the Board, then approved by members at the AGM
- The AGM is open to all members, with reports, updates and opportunities to ask questions
- Trustees meet **monthly** and each oversees an area of the Centre's operations
- 4 Trustees have personal experience of MS, bringing their experience to the heart of decision-making

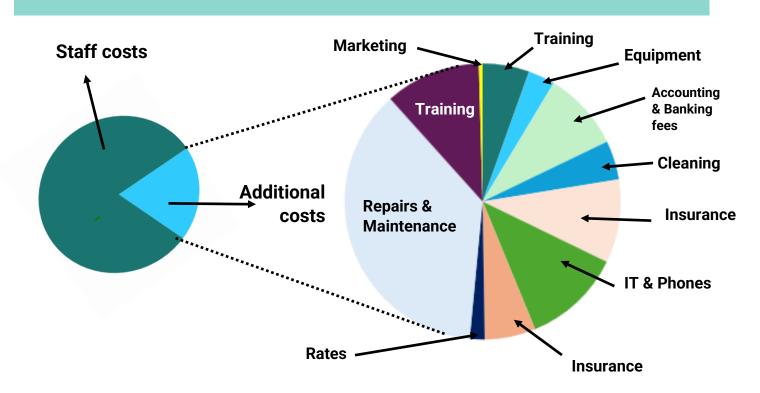

While grants and Trusts provide vital income, much of this funding is restricted to specific projects outlined in our original applications.

This means that although our income from grants and Trusts appears healthy, the majority is already earmarked for particular purposes. Securing funding to cover our core costs—such as staffing, utilities, and everyday operations—remains one of our biggest ongoing challenges.



OUR THERAPIES & SERVICES THROUGHOUT THE YEAR

- 2 x 45 minute classes or gym session for every member each week
- 2 x 1 hour online classes per week offered to members
- 1-to-1 appointments
- Annual reviews for all members to update treatment plans
- Occupational Therapy Service
- Three new classes tailored for members with Parkinson's Disease
- Several new pieces of equipment purchased
- Monthly training program for staff to support professional development
- Whole evidence based care development sessions

Subsidised services:

- MSK assessments and support
- Reiki Therapy
- Yogalates classes for friends, family and carers
 Additional paid for services:

TENS machine hire

- Podiatry services
- Beauty therapies & massage
- Members shop— physiotherapy and disability equipment.

POINTS OF INTEREST

A snapshot of the year's key facts and challenges

100% Self-Funded

We receive no statutory revenue funding.

Our income is entirely dependent on:

- Successful Grant & Trust applications
- Fundraising activities
- Donations from members & supporters

Everyone plays a role: staff, members, and Trustees are all actively involved in income generation.

Financial Pressures

Main costs:

- Staffing
- · Energy & maintenance costs
- Unplanned drainage works: £15,387

Charity Reserves

£459,384 (2025), up from £453,564 (2024)

Reserves are essential for resilience in times of unforeseen difficulty.

Recent uplanned expenditure (drain repairs) has limited growth of reserves and therefore., new income streams are needed to sustain therapy services.

Rising Challenges in Funding

Grants & Trusts are increasingly competitive. Therefore, we must explore new and sustainable income streams.

Fundraising Snapshot

Fundraising income rose significantly thanks to externally led sponsored sporting events.

Still, it only covered 18% of annual costs.

Wide Community Reach

Our members primarily come from Sutton & Croydon. Others travel or attend online classes from Kent, Kingston, Lambeth, Merton, Wandsworth, Mole Valley, Epsom & Ewell, Reigate & Banstead, Havant, and Tandridge.

We continue to hold Living Wage Employer status. This helps:

CHALLENGES & LOOKING AHEAD

As costs for staffing, maintenance, and energy rise, our income isn't keeping pace. Without action, our reserves will shrink. The Trustees have set a clear plan for 2025–2026 to protect our future and grow our services.

OUR PRIORITIES

- Protect reserves and avoid further losses
- Expand therapy provision for people with neurological conditions

BUSINESS PLAN

- Boost donations and Gift Aid to cover 45%+ of costs
- Launch new income streams for 5%+ of funding
- Secure 30%+ from Grants & Trusts through stronger applications
- Maintain fundraising events to deliver 20%+ of income
- Promote services via GPs, nurses & support networks to grow membership
- Increase uptake of new Parkinson's classes
- Launch paid community classes to support long-term sustainability
- Build staff expertise with continuous learning
- Expand Occupational Therapy with more tailored classes
- Engage local businesses for sponsorship
- Promote Centre spaces for community hire
